


# MESSENGER – August 2020



#### Dear Partners in Ministry,

Communion is coming.

It's such a relief to type those words! We've missed gathering around the table with you during these last five months, to remember and be re-membered by Christ's body. We are looking forward immensely to sharing in the

sacrament with you in the weeks to come.

Below are some answers to questions you may have:

#### When and where?

We will offer communion at our in-person worship service at 8:30am on Sundays in the church parking lot. We hope to begin on August 9<sup>th</sup>, pending the arrival of prefilled communion cups.

#### Prefilled whatsits?

Yes, exactly. We needed to figure out how to get bread and wine into everyone's hands while also keeping 6 feet apart and making sure the bread and wine is handled hygienically at every stage of preparation and distribution. The solution the reopening team decided to try out this August involves prefilled cups. Each little chalice has wine at one end and bread at the other. As you arrive for worship, you'll be invited to take one to your seat with you.

# Is there still a gluten-free and grape juice option?

Yes. There will be two kinds of pre-filled cups available, clearly labelled: one set is bread and wine, while another is gluten-free bread and grape juice. You'll be able to choose whatever fits your needs.

#### What happens at the communion part of the service?

The presiding minister will lead us through the eucharistic rite. After the Words of Institution and the Lord's Prayer, we'll receive bread and wine at our seats. The musicians will lead a time of reflection accompanied by sacred music. As the service ends, there will be receptacles to receive the used communion cups.

# I've heard that other churches are doing communion more like how we used to. Why aren't we?

Every church is figuring this out as they go, us included! The priorities that guided us to this decision included safety and sanctity. We are committed to showing love to one another by

taking steps to reduce the chance of viral transmission, while still preserving the holiness of this rite. We're not sure we'll get it right the first time—to be honest, we probably won't! We count on your participation and feedback to help guide us as we revisit these decisions in weeks to come.

# I'm not planning on coming to in-person services until there's a vaccine. Will there be online communion offered?

No, not right now. Guidance from the ELCA urges caution in going that route, encouraging education and careful consideration before adopting such a practice. Neither Pastor Jeff nor Pastor Larson totally rule out online communion as a future option, but we have a lot more thinking to do, and we'd want you to do it with us. In the meantime, if you are longing for communion and cannot come to in-person worship, **please call and email the pastors and tell us.** In this time of COVID, the absence of regularly worshiping together means we don't get the regular temperature checks about what's most important to you right now. If you have a need we can help meet, then please let us know.

We're grateful for your patience and for the faithful work of our reopening team as we wrestled with the logistical challenges of sharing communion during COVID. We know that August will be a month of learning and adapting, but folks, the bottom line is: we just can't wait to gather with you around this Holy Supper.

# **COUNCIL NOTES**

On Tuesday, July 21st, the Council held their regular monthly meeting. This was a virtual Zoom meeting due to the pandemic.

After opening prayers, we quickly moved on to a discussion of finances. The highlights from our Treasurer, Joann Duncan, are as follows:

- Operating Income for the month of June was approximately \$30,000. This is significantly less than the budgeted \$51,000. Some of this can be attributed to timing issues due to May having five Sundays and we may be starting to see the effects of the pandemic on giving. Overall, the year to date income numbers still look good, so we will watch to make sure this drop is not a continued trend.
- The staff are doing a great job at managing expenses and we are seeing savings that help offset the drop in income.

Council made the very difficult decision to furlough Shell, our Nursery Coordinator. We are hopeful, we will have her back running our Nursery again one day soon.

Council has been meeting quite a bit lately and decided to take this week to thoroughly review the three prior meeting minutes and vote on their approval via email. They will be posted once approved.

Based on the information brought to Council, the RIC Committee has been very prayerfully and thoughtfully discerning how they, as a committee and we as a church, can help to end racism in our community. They brought, to Council, a request to place a sign addressing the need to end racism on the Church lawn. We voted unanimously to have them research potential signs and present some options at the next Council meeting.

We were very happy to hear the outdoor services are going well and moving the service, for now, to 8:30 am and holding it on the west side of the building is helping to make it more comfortable.

We know this pandemic has gotten, for lack of a better word, old. Please let us know if there is anything, we can do to assist you and your family during this time.

# **RIC UPDATE (RECONCILING IN CHRIST)**

At last month's meeting, the RIC Committee had an in-depth discussion about how we could bring a stronger focus to anti-racism at Good Shepherd. As our welcoming statement includes all races, we felt that this is an issue that deserves greater focus, and as a committee we are willing to take this on.

Our discussion first centered on the idea of putting a "Black Lives Matter" sign on the church grounds. We had some concerns with this particular sign, but also felt that we should make some kind of explicit anti-racism statement publicly. But we also felt that, as a church, we need to bring more education and awareness to the topic of anti-racism because without that, the sign would be meaningless. The committee committed to investigating how that might be done and will develop some recommendations for the fall. Here are some of the comments that occurred during our discussion.

"The community doesn't know what our Welcoming Statement is; (the sign) would show that we mean it."

"People of color live with being uncomfortable every day of their lives because of the color of their skin."

"It's not enough to not be racist - you have to be anti-racist. We cannot be bystanders - we need to show support."

"I would love to see a Black Lives Matter sign in front of the church."

"Educating people first would help - if they take it as a personal 'dis', it may just be a lack of education."

"I'm concerned that some members would feel that we are campaigning against them unless we educate them."

"Black Lives Matter is a noble sentiment but it is also the name of a political organization. Would it be clear which Good Shepherd was supporting?"

"We shouldn't put up a sign 'just for the fun of it'; we should find ways to educate and involve our community in anti-racism."

We are thinking about our worship schedule, how we can best offer Sunday school and adult forum, how we can best offer our Midweek Bible class (5th and 6th graders), our Confirmation class (7th and 8th graders), and other adult studies. We are exploring whether it's possible to offer a fall congregation retreat to Camp Calumet. At some point, the weather will change, and we may not be able to comfortably offer an outdoors worship service. Essentially, there are a lot of questions right now! We are doing our best to adapt what we have done in previous years to the reality we face in 2020. We'll have more information to share in our September messenger. #### Youth Gathering Postponed

nor do I really know myself,

And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing.

I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire.

And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road,

though I may know nothing about it.

Therefore will I trust you always though

I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death.

I will not fear, for you are ever with me,

and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.
